"A CHALLENGING ART..."

A contemporary author and theologian has written that "Forgiveness is another word for 'letting go'...Learning forgiveness—both granting it to others and accepting for ourselves—is one of the primary disciplines of the spiritual journey. Many continue to be plagued with strong feelings of regret and guilt, but as our accountability expands we begin to experience our lives in a new perspective. We no longer need to carry the guilt as if we deserve more punishment. The spiritual or faith journey challenges us to let go.

Other variations on "letting go: might include: ... to LET GO is not to take responsibility for another, but to care about the other; not to fix, but to be supportive; not to judge, but to allow another just be who she or he is; not to deny, but to accept; not to regret the past, but to learn from it; not to fear less, but to love more....

Letting go (not just of our hurts, but our attachments as well) is one of the most challenging of our experiences. In many ways, it is an ART! In many ways, it is transformational. It's like moving from a closed fist to an open hand. As we take a more open attitude toward life, we can free ourselves more and more from the self-made clutter that litters our daily paths. This, of course, calls for a willingness to shed some of our false fronts—those alternate mask we wear to hold onto to shade our identity. But after a while, they no longer serve us!

Our soul's journey is not about acquiring more and more whatever. It is a journey reminding us of those truths we have long heard and known. It is not a process of achieving one high after another. It is a process of freeing ourselves to the newness of each moment, clearning away those fears and thoughts that block us. As someone once said:

"Something we were withholding made us weak until we found it was ourselves."

On June 4, 2014, a law went into effect in the State of Illinois allowing persons of the same sex to be legally married and receive all of the rights associated with that union. After a summer of study and discussions with the congregation, the Ministry of Deacons has recommended to the Church Council that same sex marriages be allowed to be officiated in our church. The recommendation was reached after the Deacons received questionnaires from the congregation which were overwhelmingly in support of this recommendation. The Council received the recommendation and voted unanimously to approve it.



Long Range Plan-Phase I, Building Renovations-Update

Here is where we are as of 9-17-2014:

We are happy to report now that we have received **69** pledges to date for just over **\$120,206** to repay ourselves from what we borrowed from Endowment Fund to do the renovations. At this writing it is so wonderful to be back in our new sanctuary. We hear so many good comments about the renovations and especially the new door from the elevator to the overflow.

A gift was given from the funds in Memory of Delores Leiting to the Memorial Garden Project now located behind the Parsonage. This project was our own Tim Hellyer's Eagle Scout Project and is now complete for all of us to enjoy.

CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH OF ALGONQUIN ENDOWMENT FUND INVESTMENT GUIDELINES (effective 9-21-2014)

- I. Place the entire amount of the designated and undesignated gifts contributed to the Congregational Church of Algonquin Endowment Fund (FUND) with an Investment Manager chosen by the Ministry of Church Finance and approved by the Church Council.
- II. The investment criteria provided to the Investment Manager for the FUND shall include the following:
 - a. The long-term goal for the FUND should be to achieve a maximum return on investment while maintaining a moderate risk of financial loss, emphasizing equities for higher capital appreciation potential while maintaining an appropriate level of fixed-income investment component to temper market volatility.
 - b. Performance of the FUND shall be compared at least annually with performance index funds such as S&P 500 Index, Russell 2000 Index and other applicable indices and the Barclays Capital Government Index for fixed-income securities. Fund managers shall strive to achieve returns equal to or better than the applicable indices.
 - C. The Target asset allocation for the FUND will be 50-70% in equities. Domestic equity positions may range from 70-100% of the total equity portion of the portfolio. Foreign security holdings may range from 0-35% of the total equity portion of the portfolio. From 30-50% of the portfolio will be invested in fixed income securities. In no case will individual investments in derivative instruments be included. The FUND may have exposure to non-socially acceptable holdings through mutual funds. The total FUND investments' exposure to non-socially acceptable holdings must be less than 3%. Purchasing or selling futures, options or forward contracts for speculative purposes or for increasing portfolio leverage should be prohibited.
 - d. The equity portion of the FUND should be invested primarily in a broadly diversified portfolio of large, medium and small capitalization common stocks of U.S-headquartered companies and in international equities of companies headquartered in developed and emerging markets
 - e. The fixed-income portion of the FUND investment should be invested primarily in intermediate and long-term U.S. Dollar-denominated investment grade government obligations and in investment grade corporate fixed-income securities.
