Dear Friends,

Prayer should be the easiest, most natural thing in the world for us to do. But try this – define prayer in a few words to someone who has no idea of what God or religion is. This simplest of activities is not so easy to define. The Interpreter's Dictionary of the Bible devotes 11 pages of very tiny print to the entry "Prayer", beginning the definition with these words:

In the Bible prayer moves from the level of magic to the heights of spiritual communion and identification of will and activity with God. No definition which would cover all the references is possible except in general terms. Prayer is attempted intercourse with God, with or without the mediation of priests or heavenly beings; it is usually, but not necessarily, vocal. It is designed by means of the creation of personal contact to affect the nature and course of the relationship. Its means and ends always depend upon how the nature of God is conceived. (Interpreter's Dictionary of the Bible, volume K-Q, p.857)

This is only about prayer in the Bible. It does not address private prayer, prayers of other faiths, types of prayers, methods of praying or the efficacy of prayer! Archeologists say that they have found evidence of prayers of the Neanderthals who lived from 200,000 to 30,000 B.C.E. Prayers have been offered by religious zealots, atheists and everyone in between. Its such a large and exciting topic that we have decided to devote our whole summer to the study of prayer!

I encourage you to come – we will have fun while we learn. There will be games, hands-on activities, contests. So join us – bring your friends. I guarantee you will not be disappointed. And at the end, we will all be better in our prayer life!


To help people who cannot come to church feel a part of our family, we are asking you for three things:


The Heavenly Attic Resale Shop stocks gently used items and is open to the public. Proceeds from the Attic support the missions and ministries of the CCA.

McHenry County College (12 hours of free instruction plus 10 hours of practicum experience)



MISSION: POSSIBLE A Tale of Love in Action



Barb and Don Schmidt volunteer weekly at ReStore Elgin, a Habitat for Humanity "reuse center."

Several years ago, Barb and Don Schmidt were looking for additional ways to "give back" out of the abundance of God's gifts to them. They call it "stewardship of their time and talents." They found the ReStore reuse center in their town of Elgin. For three hours every Friday morning, Don uses his talents for "fixing things" by testing and repairing equipment such as lights and fans, while Barb is busy stocking shelves.

Because they are doing much needed work behind the scenes at the center, their personal contacts are primarily with other volunteers. They enjoy talking with a gentleman from India, who is a Hindu, and working with a mentally-challenged man who is gaining skills and self-confidence through the work he does.

P.S. The Schmidts have recently also taken on a totally different way to give back. They are tutoring two adults who wish to improve their English (through The Literacy Connection of Elgin and as part of our church's Literacy Tutoring Program.)

ReStore Elgin is a reuse center benefiting Habitat for Humanity of Northern Fox Valley. ReStore accepts donated new and gently used goods from retailers, manufacturers, distributors, contractors, and homeowners. Home equipment, furniture and building supplies are then sold at greatly reduced prices to the general public. The store's operation generates funds to support Habitat's home building program in the Northern Fox Valley area.

Fair Trade June 14th

We have met our goal for The Red Cherry Challenge! We had pledged to buy 100 pounds of coffee before the end of May, and we have reached that already! All the coffee we buy continues to support this program at 10 cents per pound, but adds no cost to what we order. Equal Exchange will use this money to help growers in South and Central America combat leave rust which is threatening coffee crops is it creeps to higher elevations because of climate change. About those empty coffee bags and cocoa containers, think about these when you are starting seeds for spring planting. And if you bought the single-serve (K-Cups), the components can be composed and recycled after you reuse them to start seeds! The hole is already in the bottom of the cup ready to go. If you have used honey jars they can be returned to the beekeeper in Woodstock to be sterilized and refilled with this season's honey. Drop them off anytime. We can be proud of the difference we are making around the world for small growers. And our purchases continue to support the Franklinton Center in North Carolina. 15 cents from every pound of all products is donated at no additional cost to us. Our sales are averaging \$180, and our purchases weigh 25 to 30 pounds each month. Check out the information in the blue notebook on our table on the second Sunday this month.

Equal Exchange's mission is to build long-term trade partnerships that are economically just and environmentally sound, to foster mutually beneficial relationships between farmers and consumers and to demonstrate, through our success, the contribution of worker co-operatives and Fair Trade to a more equitable, democratic and sustainable world.
